

SBC Serves at EEFC

(photo credit: Kirsten Hildebrand) An unofficial partnership between Steinbach Bible College and the Emmanuel Evangelical Free Church (EEFC) in Steinbach has been forming naturally over the last several years. SBC continually trains students for ministry, and EEFC continues to give these students opportunities to put their training into practice.

"Over the past six years, we have had thirteen SBC students join the Emmanuel ministry team, either as interns or hired as permanent staff," says EEFC's Student Ministries Pastor, Jori Dueck.

To explore how this mutually beneficial partnership, which empowers upcoming servant leaders, has impacted both the church and the students, this article will feature the stories of two SBC alumni who are now permanent staff, one current intern, and a reflection from Pastor Dueck.

Pastor Jori Dueck

How have SBC students been beneficial for Emmanuel?

"Having SBC students join our team has been immensely beneficial for our church as SBC provides amazing Biblical education that helps prepare students for vocational ministry. By the time they get to Emmanuel, they already have a good understanding of the Bible and a lot of equipping to be able to do ministry well. SBC produces students that not only know the Word, but who also truly love the Word, Jesus, and the Church. Beyond that, Emmanuel benefits from the high value SBC places on developing students with good character and a heart for servant leadership. Having students with a love for Jesus, a knowledge of the Word and

ministry, and integrity has benefited Emmanuel greatly."

What do you love about your role?

"I get to work with amazing people on my volunteer teams, and I get to explore how to worship God creatively with our community."

How did your time at SBC equip you for this role?

"I came to SBC with a very limited view of what worship means and left SBC understanding that worship is a lifestyle, and God calls us to use every form of our bodies and creativity to adore him. In turn I've been able to use the knowledge that I was given and training I received to implement new technology, worship elements, passion, and leadership for the various teams I lead."



What value do you find in going to SBC before entering vocational ministry?

"Ministry is hard work! SBC gives great knowledge but also practical help with getting into the ministry world slowly and with support, training, and encouragement. I also had the pleasure of learning from professors who had, or were currently, working in ministry so they were able to teach from first-hand experience what it was like. That insight proved to be immeasurable. I began working full-time in a church position straight out of college and I believe strongly that the process of transition to "the real world" was eased by the intentional teaching I received from SBC."

Kirsten Friesen (Office Manager) What do you love about your role?

"What I love about my job is being able to use my administrative gifting in a place where I feel valued and appreciated. I also love that it allows me to make connections with staff and congregants to further our vision and make personal connections with others."

What value do you find in going to SBC before entering vocational ministry?

"Through SBC, I developed a biblical foundation and was able to gain confidence in how to study and discuss the Bible. For me, the lasting impact was not so much the things I learned, but the way I learned how to learn. In a world where we are being thrown immense amounts of information about everything, it has been very helpful to have tools in my belt to be able to wade through what the world and the church are saying about the Bible and culture. Some of these skills have given me the ability to have tough conversations and navigate uncertain times in both my professional life and my personal life."

Grace Wieler (3rd Year Student, EEFC Youth Min Intern)

What has your experience been like at Emmanuel?

"It has been such an incredible opportunity to serve at EEFC. Experiencing the body of Christ working together for unity is beautiful. I have been encouraged to be a part of a church who is looking to grow young leaders and has a focus on intergenerational ministry."

What do you find are the benefits of serving and studying simultaneously?

"Having the privilege to study and serve at the same time provides opportunities to practically apply what I am learning in class. It allows me to have a fuller picture of what is being taught and learn about myself regarding my part within the body of Christ. I have experienced so many 'wow' moments in serving as I reflect on concepts I have learned and see them come to life. My studies become more than just words on a page, they become part of my life."

What growth have you seen in these students?

"It's been great seeing these students grow as they put what they've learned to use in ministry. Last year specifically, I had three youth ministry interns, and it was the craziest year with Covid. There were so many things that were new to all of us in ministry, and these interns took it in stride. You don't learn in college, or anywhere else for that matter, what to do in a pandemic, but SBC teaches principles for ministry that apply to any season of life. Seeing these interns find creative applications to these principles was exciting.

"It's felt like a partnership between SBC and Emmanuel. SBC send us great students and we get to see students grow as they apply what they've learned in class to ministry."

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Alumni Update

Riley Scharfenberg ('14)

For Riley Scharfenberg, Steinbach Bible College seemed like the obvious choice growing up. The college was the Christian post-secondary institution that he knew the most about, for a number of reasons.

"My parents both went to SBC, a number of my cousins went to SBC, Professor Garth Friesen is my cousin, my church and my conference were fairly involved with SBC," he said with a laugh. "For me, SBC was THE Bible college."

His route to coming to the school, however, is one that's unique and interesting.

During his high school years, the plan was to head into business school or become an engineer. He explained that he was leaning towards being an engineer, but through a lot of prayer, the business school avenue kept coming to the forefront.

Yet through his first year in business school, there was a desire for him to come to Steinbach Bible College.

After completing one year of university, he took a year off to attend SBC without having to lose his spot in business school. He was able to do that with a letter of permission from the University of Manitoba.

"There were several courses from the SBC course catalog that could be transferred over to my university degree," he explained. "That allowed me to get that letter to go to SBC."

After being in the SBC community during his planned year on campus, he still wanted to be a part of the community. He was granted permission from SBC to spend an extra year at the college living in the dorms, while heading back to the U of M to finish his degree. Riley also was able to participate in MissionX to Northern Manitoba.

"SBC friendships go a lot deeper, and are a lot more intimate and trustworthy," he added. "When you're with a community of believers and you have similar goals, it's easy to trust each other so you can talk to them about anything."



Riley finished up his Bachelor of Commerce degree at the U of M, and was able to get started in the marketplace. He currently works as a Business Application Specialist with a company called Nutreco, a global livestock nutrition company. His main role in that work place is to assist with integrated business planning and training.

He notes that if you work in a secular place, it is important to know you'll likely be one of, if not the only, person of Godly faith in that environment, and his advice to those looking to head into marketplace ministry is simple. "Live as Christ called you to be in the workplace," he offered. "I've had many good conversations with co-workers that came to me because I was the first Christian they had met that treated them with respect or love. The greatest compliment I've ever received from a co-worker was 'You actually live what you believe.' So live what you believe in."

Riley is still involved in various ministries at Rosenort Evangelical Mennonite Church, his home church. He is currently serving as the head of the tech committee, and as the head of the Sunday school program. "I've always enjoyed being able to give kids the answers to whatever they're asking about," he answered when asked about being a Sunday School teacher. "For example, I had a full class discussion with some grade 5 students on the different translations of the Bible. They were engaged, asking why there are so many, which one is correct, and so on. I love (teaching) and seeing them engage with Scripture."


Riley says that being at SBC has helped him build a Biblical foundation, so that he can minister to others in his work and in his church.

"I wanted the best business education I could get in the province. When I wanted Bible education, I wanted the best Bible education that I knew of in Manitoba, and that was Steinbach Bible College," he concluded. "SBC is focused on all the right things, as indicated in their four core values: Bible, Discipleship, Community, and Mission." \P

This article was written at the end of October, shortly before Pursuit completed their trip to B.C. in early November.

While Manitoba was in lockdown last year due to COVID, Pursuit Director Randy Krahn and Pursuit Assistant Emily Dyck made the difficult decision to postpone the Pursuit program. They chose instead to take time to reflect and further develop and improve the program with the goal of running two sessions in 2021-22.

Dyck, who is a recent SBC graduate and joined the Pursuit program in 2020 as an intern, expressed gratitude for the extra time they had to prepare. "The waiting process has been good for my own growth and just allowing myself more time to prepare emotionally, spiritually; to be able to be in a place to lead these young people. My love for people has grown even wider in order for me to love the students that we have in our group today," she reflected.

Krahn also believes that their diligence has paid off. "To see the fruit of the year of waiting, program development, and evaluation; it's been really fun for myself to see it running again and running better," he explained.

Because of the wait, Krahn firmly believes that restarting the program has only solidified the heart of Pursuit. "It has affirmed for us the importance of doing things together in community, as a team, as a group. It has affirmed for us the importance of following Jesus in community. We call that discipleship."

Both were eager to finally put all their preparation into action this September as they kicked off the first Pursuit session of the year. The month of September flew by in a flurry for the Pursuit team. It was filled to the brim with weekly off-campus adventures some of which included navigating a corn maze, visiting the Assiniboine Park Zoo, and hiking the Hunt Lake trail. They have also embarked on a few camping trips.

When asked about her favourite camping destination, Pursuit student Tina Bueckert commented, "Red Rock Bible Camp. We got to do a lot of fun activities like archery, kayaking, and canoeing. We also had the opportunity to do a silent retreat in a beautiful setting where we got to spend time in God's Word and see His creation."

Adam Klassen, another student, agreed with her, adding, "I absolutely loved the fire and shelter-building competitions."

Through these events and intentional times of community, the team began to form friendships, cultivate their ethos, and establish a healthy rhythm of life. "Our group has grown so close that we have started to feel like a family. The best part about Pursuit is the community we have and the relationships that we have built. Everyone is there for each other through the many highs and especially the lows.



I am so glad I chose to do Pursuit. It has changed my perspective on love and community," shared Bueckert.

Krahn is delighted by the direction the team is headed. "One of the things I love most about doing something like this is seeing transformation over time in the lives of the students and observing it in myself as well," he stated.

He also noted how the students are starting to recognize the gifts God has given them by His Holy Spirit. "We have great students who are really gifted in leadership, in caring for others, and who are really creative and passionate," he observed. "As a program facilitator and someone who's a little bit further down the road, it is super fun to see things in students that maybe they haven't seen for themselves, and just point to it and say, 'this is what I'm seeing."

Towards the end of October, after spending September and early October focusing on team formation, Krahn and Dyck anticipate leading the team on their first trip beyond the borders of Manitoba. The destination: Camp Qwanoes – a

high-adventure Christian camp located on Vancouver Island, British Columbia.

During their five days at the camp, they will engage in various service projects. Tristan Klassen, SBC alumni and Assistant Director of Camp Qwanoes, reports, "The students will help us clean cabins from this past summer so they'll be ready for the summer of 2022. We plan on getting them to help re-roof our rec office if the weather turns better and we also plan on getting them to scrape barnacles off of our poles that hold our dock in place. We're also planning a little fun with them along the way."

As they gear up for the trip, Adam Klassen eagerly looks forward to the experience. "This trip is gonna be something very new for me, which is what I like about it. I've always wanted to do missions and camp ministry, and now I get to do a little bit of both. Also, I'm just really excited to go to the Pacific Ocean," he exclaimed.

SBC's theme this year, "Being Renewed" (2 Corinthians 4:16-18), celebrates how God inwardly renews His people day-by-



day as they continually look to Him amid their outward struggles. One of these recurring outward struggles, particularly for Pursuit, is navigating COVID guidelines. Krahn attested, "We're learning to be flexible and hold everything loosely, which is a good thing to learn."

When asked to reflect on how the theme is evident among the Pursuit students, Dyck shared, "I think that they all kind of came to Pursuit with the mindset, without even probably realizing it, that they needed renewal. I think that we are seeing the renewal happening through the

growth in leadership, and through their growth both spiritually and emotionally." ♥














FIXING OUR EYES

A Conversation with Professor Gord Penner

Judy Wiebe sat down with Professor Gord Penner to talk about SBC's theme for the 2021-22 school year. The following is a part of that conversation.

"16Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. ¹⁷For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. ¹⁸So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal." 2 Corinthians 4:16-18 (NIV)

These are great verses to remember even if you're having good days, or if it feels like you're snowed under.

Verse 17 says the present light troubles are easy to bear, but I don't think they're easy to bear. It sure doesn't feel like they are at the time. But in light of the exceeding eternal glory that far outweighs them, it lowers our troubles to light and momentary with a new perspective.

In fact, one of the main Hebrew translations of glory in the Old Testament directly translates to 'weight'. When it talks about the weight of glory, Paul reminds us of the light and momentary troubles are achieving for an eternal glory, or weight. What a neat play on words.

Think about a teeter totter or a seesaw in a school playground. My brother Bruce was always a hundred pounds heavier than me. I was pretty much the runt of the family, so imagine him sitting on one end and myself sitting on the other end. Whatever it was that I was weighing; well, I've got Bruce at the other end, and it far outweighs me.

I could even be carrying a five-pound weight with me all day. Think of a few five-pound weights as your light and momentary troubles. Five or ten pounds of weight; if you carry that around in a backpack all day, it feels heavy. But when you sit on the seesaw, and at the other end you see something that's eternal, of much more weight, it doesn't feel so heavy after all.

These verses are a good perspective check in the middle of what we currently are facing. To realize that the present seems really short in light of eternity.

Verse 18 says we are not watching or keeping our eyes on the things being seen, but on the things not being seen. For things being seen is transient or temporary, but what is unseen is eternal.

We often get caught up in life with what we see, constantly asking 'What's in the news today?'. A certain day we ask, 'What's the number of COVID cases in Manitoba?'. Eternity, we can't see it. Maybe that's where we probably need to take our eyes off our social media and even our news feeds. If we keep our eyes on those things, it begins to feel like that five or ten-pound weight in our backpack is pretty heavy.

When we put our focus on the other end of the teeter totter, then it makes no difference on my end whether I'm carrying the ten pounds or not, because I've shifted my focus towards the eternal side.

That's our challenge; not to keep our eyes on what is seen, but to focus on what is not being seen.

We all have cell phones. Sometimes, a text message or email can just sit there until we reach for it and open it up. Those also carry our to-do lists for the day, or allows us to check what the latest news crisis is. You flip on the news and the first five things are all negative things that have happened. If we open up the Bible, and read through the pages from what's happened over 2,000 years ago, what happened in Scripture is more important. That's a lot bigger than what we're facing today.

The things we see daily are temporary, and they too shall pass. God usually doesn't send emails for us to check, He sent us His Word. So, in fact we do have a text message, and it's a much better text than any text we'll ever get. \P

2020-2021 Presidential Report

This past year saw us operate fully under COVID restrictions. Unlike most colleges or universities, we were able to hold classes on campus. The result was that we had one of our largest enrollments in history! We praise God for His continued faithfulness and provisions.

We were careful to follow all the provincial health regulations. This included an increase in cleaning, and an acute attention to proper hygiene. Dorms ran a little over 50% capacity, and classes maxed out at 25 students. It also meant there would be adaptations and flexibility to virtually everything we did.

We utilized a hybrid approach to teaching. This meant that all classes were live on video, so that students who were not able to be in class could still participate from the confines of their room or home. The classes were also recorded so that students not feeling well could view the class at their earliest convenience.

All of this required a significant investment (\$25,000-\$30,000) in technology. Thanks to the generous support of a few key donors, we were able to purchase the cameras,

microphones, and monitors needed to expand the reach of our classes.

Upon reflecting back at the year, I am so grateful for the amazing attitudes of our SBC community. The students were so gracious as we experimented and learned new technology and teaching methods. I admire the faculty for their willingness to adapt to a new teaching format on short notice.

Behind the scenes, our staff gave of their time and energies to ensure that the year ran as smooth as possible. To all, I say a big thank you! Finally, I thank you for all of your prayers, encouragement, and your financial support. You make up a big part of our ministry.

Highlights of faculty involvements this fall:

- **Gord Penner** is teaching Introduction to Old Testament and 1 Corinthians, two of his favorite courses. He enjoys travelling to teach courses in places like Winkler Bible Camp, Taber, Alberta, and beyond.
- Garth Friesen is directing the youth ministry program including a Camp Ministries course this fall. He enjoys discipling first-year students through the Spiritual Formation course and connecting with community youth pastors.
- Arlene Friesen is Registrar and Student Ministries Director. She is directing the Worship Arts program, teaching Bible and worship courses, and mentoring students in worship.

- Melissa Dueck has returned as music specialist, responsible for developing student musical talent. She directs the Ignite touring music ensemble and the Imminent chapel ensemble.
- Sarah Barkman has moved from eight years in the Registration Office to become the Director of Library Services as she continues graduate studies.
- Richard Klassen is back with students rehearsing a modern classic, The Princess Bride, for November 11-14. We hope this story will bring joy to families after a season without live performances. Question: How did the
